


Peak District National Park

In 2003 Derbyshire County Council published the 'Landscape Character of Derbyshire' document supported by the Countryside Agency (now Natural England) and the District and Borough Councils, which was reviewed and updated in 2013. This document defines and describes the different landscape character areas across the county and identifies the components of the landscape that contribute to these variations. Landscape character is now the basis for landscape policy across the county and is a key evidence base in all Local Plans.
