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




6 CROMFORD CANAL

Roam along the banks of the canal, built in the 1790s to unlock Derbyshire's immense mineral wealth and now a rich haven for plants and wildlife. Discover the cottages, churches, pubs, school and the remains of the cotton and bleach works that were built to serve the Strutt industrial community from 1781.

14 DARLEY ABBEY

Within walking distance of Derby City centre is the remarkable factory village of Darley Abbey, created by the Evans family from the 1780s onwards and including SK Matthew's Church, Pause beside the river Derwent, within sight of one of the most complete early textile mill complexes.

Enjoy the open space of unspoilt parkland, once part of the Evans family estate, with fine views of Derby.
