## Directions:

**By car:** Cromford stands on the A6, 17 miles north of Derby. It is within easy reach of the M1 - about 20 minutes. Satnay - please use postcode DE4 3RQ.

**By train**: there is a regular service between Derby and Matlock which stops at Cromford. The trains are operated by East Midlands Trains. Train times can be consulted on their <u>website</u> (link is external)

**By bus**: there are two services from Derby, the TransPeak operated by <u>High Peak</u> and the 6.1 operated by <u>Trent Barton</u>, Telephone: 01773 712265. Full bus information and timetable is available on their websites.

**Access:** the Gothic Warehouse first floor is not accessible by wheelchair. The Mill/Wharf complexes are accessible by wheelchair, but there is some uneven surfaces.

# Willersley Castle

## Directions:

If using SATNAV please enter post code DE4 5JG

#### By road from the South:

Take the M1 to junction 26 and follow the A610 towards Ripley. Follow the A610 until you reach the A6 and turn right.

At Cromford turn right at the traffic lights, and follow the road past the mill. Willersley Castle Hotel's driveway is immediately on the left after you cross the bridge.

### By road from the North:

Take the M1 to junction 28 and follow the A38 towards Derby. Follow signs to Matlock via the A615. At the roundabout in Matlock turn left and follow A6 through Matlock Bath to Cromford.

Turn left at traffic lights past the mill. Willersley Castle Hotel's driveway is immediately on the left after you cross over the bridge.

#### By Rail:

Trains are available to Cromford on the Derby – Matlock line. It is advisable to check with your railway station for times and connections. Only limited services are available on Sundays.

Leave Cromford Station, turn right just before the bridge into the drive of Willersley Castle Hotel. The hotel is a 10 minute walk from Cromford station.

If a taxi is required, please arrange at Derby Station or before your journey, as there is no telephone at Cromford Station.
