Opportunities for Key Stage 2

Available from Holmebrook Valley Park, Chesterfield:

Investigating Rivers

Making use of Holmebrook, a shallow, clean stream, pupils will observe erosion, deposition and meanders, looking in depth at many associated features. There will be lots of practical work, including annotating sketches, measuring speed of flow, stream profiles and river dipping.



Habitats

Using a variety of dry and wetland habitats, including hedgerows, lakes and grassland, pupils will complete fieldwork activities such as grass sweeping, bird watching, tree shaking and pond dipping. They will also practice observation and identification skills and play games to learn about adaptation and interdependence.

Geography Skills

Using the park as a case study, pupils will begin to understand the changing nature of land use, as the park has been transformed from open cast coal mine to parkland in less than 30 years. Pupils will develop geographical skills such as map use, field sketching, compass use, data gathering, questionnaires and aerial photo interpretation.

Awesome Orienteering

Orienteering is a sport that challenges both the mind and the body. During this day we will combine outdoor adventure, map skills, team work and planning. Develop your skills and then take part in an orienteering competition.
